This moving drama follows Saul Indian Horse from childhood, where he is placed in a residential school, through his adolescence as a gifted, rising hockey star, to later adulthood, when he succumbs to substance abuse and must draw on his own indomitable spirit to overcome the harrowing experiences he suffered in the residential school system. This film deals with mature subjects such as physical and sexual abuse, racism, and the ongoing trauma and impact of Canada's residential school system, all of which may be triggering and difficult for viewers. However, the ultimate message of the film is one of hope and healing, and it provides an excellent opportunity for thoughtful conversation among students and teachers, which can lead to deeper empathy and understanding.

Guns	✓				A shotgun is used to block the doorway when The Moose team try to leave a bar (not pointed at them).		
Physical Violence				√	Four men beat up Saul's teammate and then urinate on him; brawling; body checking in hockey games.		
Child Abuse				√	In the residential school, children are punished by being placed in isolation in a cage in the dark basement; after a child wets his bed, the priest pushes the boy's face into the soiled sheets; the priest forces Saul to perform oral sex on him.		
Suicide		√			While in the cage, a young girl hits her head repeatedly against the bars. The next day, she is found dead. Later, her older sister stabs herself off-screen.

Partial Nudity	✓			The residential school officials force- strip the six-year-old Saul and Lonnie to their underwear and push them into the bath.			
SEXUAL CONTENT							
Oral Sex and Sexual Abuse	✓			Flashback to when six-year-old Saul was forced to perform oral sex on a priest. No nudity.			
LANGUAGE							
Racial Slurs		✓		"So many redskins", "Wagon Burner", "We're gonna scalp you Indians", "Keep your head up, Chief"			
SUBSTANCES							
Alcohol			✓	Saul and his teammates drink at a bar; Saul drinks alone several times in his middle age; Saul in the hospital with dried-up vomit on his face.			
Cigarettes		✓		Both adults and teenagers are seen smoking cigarettes.
